I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate our Detroit Axle members on ratifying a record-breaking contract. This is a landmark victory for the members at Detroit Axle. The contract was ratified with an 84% YES vote.

I would now like to turn my attention to the Detroit Axle Bargaining Committee. The Detroit Axle negotiations were fueled by a strong set of resolutions provided by the membership. The demands were clear, and included better wages, stronger benefits, improved safety standards, and a more secure path forward for both current and future employees. The Bargaining Committee took the resolutions seriously, treating them as a mandate.

Over weeks of intense talks, the committee pushed back against corporate resistance, stayed late into the night hashing out details, and held firm to the priorities of the membership. The result is a historic

contract that sets a new standard across the industry.

They didn't just reach their goals, they surpassed expectations. They achieved significant wage increases across all classifications — the largest in company history. They secured enhanced healthcare coverage with no increase in out-of-pocket costs, they obtained expanded vacation and leave policies, recognizing the need for work-life balance, and negotiated for increased investment in safety and training, ensuring safer working conditions and pathways for skill development. And so much more.

Make no mistake about it, this contract didn't just happen, it took Solidarity from the shop floor to the

negotiating table. They had the support of their Local 163 Brothers and Sisters, as well as support from their Daimler Truck Brothers and Sisters, who sent messages of their support from as far away as UAW Local 5287 at Thomas Built Bus in High Point, NC.

At the heart of this victory stands the Bargaining Committee, a team of committed Union members who worked tirelessly to carry the voice of the membership to the negotiating table and fight for a better future for every worker on the floor, I witnessed them fight with everything they had. And as President of UAW Local 163, I am extremely proud of all of them. WE ARE UAW LOCAL 163!

DDC Chairman's Report

Greetings Brothers and Sisters,

The Detroit Diesel Shop Committee and I have been very busy lately and I am happy to report that I have some good news to share with all of you. First, I would like to start off by saying we will be calling back 80 members from layoff. While this still leaves 40+ members still on layoff, I want to assure all of you we are working hard to bring everyone back and will not be whole until you return. I want to remind you to be ready for the pre-employment screening which you will be required to undergo as part of your call back procedure.

Secondly, we are waiting to see how the results of the ongoing tariffs (coupled with the changing of EPA standards) are going to impact the anticipated buy ahead of engines. There is speculation that these changes may "flatten out" the curve we originally anticipated of "buy ahead" orders.

I have good news to share regarding our 3PL Warehouse also known as the Detroit Logistics Center. We will be encapsulating work that in currently being done at the Matrix warehouse and leasing and additional 90,000 square feet of warehouse space. This insourcing will provide job security for the members at the warehouse. I have an announcement regarding profit sharing. Profit sharing will be paid

out in 2026 for 2025. We will also be receiving a 4% bonus in June this year which will be calculated from May 2024 to May 2025.

The committee and I are fighting to secure Juneteenth as holiday on the engine side of the business.

I would also like to mention that we need our members to get involved, we will be posting training opportunities soon. The UAW offers a UAW Family Scholarship at Black Lake. It is a great opportunity to spend a week with your family and learn about our Union at the Walter and May Reuther Education Center at Black Lake in Onaway, MI. If you have interest in finding out more, contact your Committeeman.

To our members who are on layoff, I would like to remind you that we have a Community Service Committee led by Sister Alicia Ivy who have collecting items to provide to our laid off members. This committee's entire function is to serve our members and the community. Please make sure to take advantage of the supplies that they have collected for our laid off members. I would also like to mention to our active employees, if you are interested in assisting our laid off Brothers and Sisters, please drop off any of the supplies listed on the flyer below in either of the Community Service red boxes located at both entrances to the plant. Also, if you are interested in making a big impact, please consider donating Kroger gift cards for our current laid off members. We are our Brothers and Sisters keeper!

Lastly, I would like to talk about mental health awareness. We have an EAP (Employee Assistance Program) Representative named Larry Dietz. Larry can help and arrange counseling for issues such as mourning the loss of a loved one, substance issues, guiding members through life's challenges, whether work related or not, and being your advocate. His goal is to not only assist, but to assess you and your situation so he can help you find the proper resources. Mental health is a topic we don't give enough attention to, and we need to be more diligent about it for ourselves and when looking out for others.

I also wanted to remind you that we have a Fitness Center onsite located on the Telegraph side of the plant. We encourage you to use it! We also have an onsite Premise Health clinic which offers free generic prescriptions (with no co-pay) and has a convenient app that allows you to make same week appointments and review your health chart. They have recently expanded their hours of operation to Monday through Thursday 7 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. and Friday 7:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. Their services include annual physicals, acute and urgent care, generic medications, biometric screenings, lab services, flu shots and more! Your Union fought hard to provide you this benefit, please take advantage of it as it is free! The Premise Health clinic is located next to our onsite childcare facility on the Outer Drive side of the plant.

Lastly, I want to remind you that we will be having a General Membership Meeting on Sunday, April 27th, at 11:00 a.m. These meetings typically last about an hour and gives members the opportunity to hear information right from the source. This also allows us to vote on important issues that impact our Union and allows you the opportunity to ask any questions you might have. I hope you can join us!

Greetings Romulus Brothers and Sisters,

Hope everyone is looking forward to warmer weather. I would like to take this opportunity to provide an update on the current UAW-GM Apprenticeship program.

Currently, here at the GM-Romulus GPS Facility we have thirteen active apprentices along with one JIT. Congratulation and welcome to our two newest electrical apprentice Richard Roach and Du-Shaw Russaw. GM-UAW STARC program consists of two semesters (2 classes/semester) of online courses. The program is available for both internal and external folks. For internal employees that qualify, their TAP benefits will cover the cost. For all others it requires self-pay out of pocket cost. For external individuals who

self-pay for the program can be reimbursed after being indentured and completing the mandatory probationary period. Once the individual completes the program that person is placed on the corporate apprenticeship list by seniority for internal candidates and program completion date for external candidates. Deadline dates for program completion is 06/30 and 12/31 of each year. Following the deadline dates, those who have completed the program should receive an email from the NAC (National Apprentice Committee) the following month with a congratulatory letter and a survey for their preferred trade/plants for apprentice

indenturing. During the survey period, this is also a time for individuals currently on the readiness list to review and update their selections if they so choose.

With the ongoing hourly SAP initiative there is continued shortage of skilled trades at the sites. GM-UAW have been active in adding new apprentices in all trades. For those interested this

may be a good opportunity to look at the STARC Program. Nobody can guarantee when offers will be extended or the amount of time someone may remain on the candidate list but due to the shortage in the skilled trades and the expected attrition of our current skilled trade work force. The potential demands for more apprentices will be significant moving forward. We encourage all internal GM employees to be contacting myself if you want to register for the STARC program. We can get all questions answered and assist with the TAP process and registration. If there are questions for external candidates, we are more than happy to assist with those questions and provide guidance. My time accommodates all three shifts. If you have any questions or want to schedule a meeting email or call. I look forward in assisting with any questions you may have.

Not only did we take great strides towards reaching wage parity with our union family at Detroit Diesel, but secured COLA and Profit Sharing without concessions. As we move forward, with economic turmoil looming amidst an assault

on the working class by elected officials, having mechanisms in place that can help our wages keep pace with inflation, and are tied to the same metrics that determine profitability for shareholder dividends are massive wins for us that will help our new wages escalate with unforeseen economic changes ahead. We also won victories in adding to our Skilled Trades programs, enhanced safety commitments, higher shift premiums, and much morewithout negative changes to health care and retirement benefits.

with our sister units. I would like to see the wage progression truncated and everyone reach max wage sooner. I would like increased educational and tuition benefits, along with fewer restrictions on the types of programs eligible. Start thinking, planning, and talking

UAW T.A.P Program GM Romulus By: Darryl Stephens

Happy springtime, Brothers and Sisters of Local 163, spring is a time of renewal when things start to wake up and replenish. The leaves start to grow the grass starts to turn green and require attention, the rain brings beautiful flowers, and the sun begins to shine and awaken our senses.

During this time of renewal, I would just like to remind everyone our T.A.P. (Tuition Assistance Program) benefits are reset as well as our D.S.P. (Dependent Scholarship Program) benefits and our vacation time. Plans for new adventures are being made, as well as plans for assisting our loved ones with their journeys in life. Tuition assistance is a valuable tool we can use to help ourselves with our own journey to less dependence on just General Motors by accessing our negotiated benefits of:

Benefit Levels - (T.A.P.)

Active Tuition Assistance benefit levels established by the 2023 UAW-GM National Agreement are:

• \$8,000 per calendar year for courses at regionally accredited colleges or universities

Regional accreditation is a status granted to colleges and universities found to either meet or exceed academic quality standards established by an accrediting agency through an assessment process. This type of designation indicates academic quality for educational institutions, with emphasis focused on academic core values of performance, integrity, and quality assurance. Schools that have achieved this type of accreditation assure that the educational institution satisfied quality standards established by experts.

- \$4,000 per calendar year for job related courses
- \$1,500 per calendar year for personal enhancement courses not related to the employee's current job assignment, excluding courses commonly considered sports, games, and hobbies.

Our benefit level for Dependent Scholarship Program is \$1600.00 / eligible dependent per calendar year.

Eligibility for the Program:

- Dependent children of active UAW represented employees who are pursuing post-secondary education or training at an institution accredited by a governmental or nationally recognized agency are eligible to apply for continuing education support.
- Child of employee or employees' spouse by birth, legal adoption, or legal guardianship.
- Unmarried dependent child (age 26 and under at the time of course enrollment)

Required documents that employee must provide for reimbursement:

- Verification of satisfactory completion of semester coursework
- Verification of dependency
- · Verification of payment

Please keep in mind each program has its own set of guidelines that need to be followed.

For the T.A.P. Program it is important to remember it is a pre-approval process you must apply for acceptance before beginning classes, a voucher will be issued to pay for the class. There are no reimbursements made for T.A.P. and as always after completion of a class you must show proof of completion by uploading documentation. This will allow you to continue being eligible for your next class. Those who fail to provide the documentation will lose eligibility. To have your benefits reactivated you will have to pay for a class in advance out of pocket, pass it and show documentation of completion to have your benefits reinstated.

The Dependent Scholarship Program on the other hand is a total reimbursement program you must pay for the class in advance as well as request the class which you prefer to be reimbursed for in advance, for each eligible dependent. You have 30 days before the class starts to request to be reimbursed and 30 days after the class ends to provide necessary documentation of completion and eligibility, shown in the above statement. If you are outside of the 30-day window before the class starts for a request to be reimbursed or after the class ends you will not be reimbursed for that cycle.

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NEGOTIATION REPORT

Union Brothers and Sisters of Local 163,

We are asking for your support in our upcoming negotiations on our eighth contract with North **America Fuel System** Remanufacturing LLC. Our journey started on March 6th, 1989, with Roger Penske and Robert BOSCH. We are the Reman Center that remanufactures the fuel system to the great engines you build at **Detroit Diesel, that so many** truckers like. Detroit Diesel has six Reman centers, five are in North America and one is in Mexico. We are the only Union Reman Center out of all six and we have gone through four different owners and two joint ventures. We had Roger Penske and Robert BOSCH, Roger Penske, Daimler Chrysler, **Daimler Trucks North America** to Daimler Trucks North

America and Robert BOSCH Joint venture.

Our Contracts have been small increases in pay, and we have lost our Pension and language for 30 years and out. We started out with an 80/20 benefit package and went to a great one of 100% define health care plan that our members could take care of their family with. Our 100% health care benefit plant went on for 24 years and the company made a profit. It was not until 2020 that the company had us move to a 90/10 plan with high deductibles. Our members were asked in 2004 to keep the same pay scale with a small increase at the top out, and we were told they would take care of us. This never happened and we still helped them grow the business and continue to train the workers.

As I continue to watch our market in the Global industry and see it is climbing and still will be a great market in 2030, it is time our membership sees a

record contract that will allow them to comfortably support their family. We are not saying we are trying to break the company, but with their profits and their market share they should take care of the workers better. Our members are looking to have gains like DTNA and Detroit Axle, better benefits like we use to have, better company 401K match, COLA to stay up with inflation. We demand better language so people do not get fired over something that went on for years, and have their career destroyed, forcing them to be on a last chance agreement for three years. We demand fair outsourcing language, job security language and attendance language. As I watched DTNA and Detroit Axle with their negotiations, I supported them with my Red shirt and posted on their Facebook page. I reached out to all the DTNA Locals, including Local 163, asking for their support for North American Fuel **System Remanufacturing LLC.** We are demanding a record contract just like them.

We must continue to support all UAW members on the picket line!

Trump and the Golden Age: PT 1

During his inauguration, Donald Trump stated "golden age of America begins right now." The question is, for who? It isn't America's workers because he has spent the past 60 days attacking working class Americans at every turn. It isn't our allies, because he has spent the past 60 days attacking them while playing up to our enemies. It isn't the golden age for the unfortunate around the world, because he has literally pulled food out of the hands of starving people. It isn't the golden

age for America's students, because he is undercutting public education.

So, if the poor, the workers, the hungry, children, our allies or any other person of need are not experiencing a golden age, just who is? Billionaires and Vladimir Putin are the two who are experiencing Trump's golden age. However, like everything else about Trump, it isn't his idea. America experienced a similar age over 150 years ago, one that is known as the gilded age. Following the American Civil War, the rich in this country made a play to take everything, and to legally enslave all workers for themselves. American writer Mark Twain coined the term "gilded age" for his 1873 novel "The Gilded Age: A Tale of Today." The story dealt with the

greed and political corruption during reconstruction and the industrial revolution in America. It was a time of the robber barons and the largest wealthy distribution in our history up until now.

To understand Trump's "Golden Age", we need to understand what happened during the Gilded Age. In a post - Civil War United States, poverty spread across the land while a handful of wealthy individuals manipulated both the government and the marketplace to expand their wealth.

Historians place the Gilded Age from 1865-1902, beginning at the end of the Civil War known as Reconstruction to what has been called the Progressive Era. The Progressive Era is known for a call for democracy, a demand for human rights and a push for workers to organize.



The Civil War left part of the country decimated from five years of war. Congress was charged with finding a way to reintroduce the states who had seceded, and try and bring the country together. On April 14, 1865, President Abraham Lincoln was assassinated, making way for Andrew Johnson to become President. Part of reconstruction was passing laws that gave former slaves the right to vote. Johnson pardoned thousands of Confederate officers and supported the southern states passing "Black Codes" which restricted the freedoms of the former slaves. Johnson went along with attacking those who had been enslaved, while pardoning those who had done the enslaving. Justice in reverse, not unlike Trump pardoning the mob who tried to overturn a democratic election on January 6, 2021.

Lincoln had chosen Johnson as a running mate, hoping to set the stage for bringing the country back together following the war. Johnson had been appointed Military Governor of Tennessee after the Union Army took the state back under United States control. The murder of Lincoln, left the country with a president that didn't have the same vision and would undermine efforts to restore a republic that worked for ALL citizens. Congress passed the Fourteenth Amendment, granting citizenship to former slaves. Johnson opposed the measure and all other legislation Congress passed to try to bring normalcy

back and human rights to the former slaves. When Congress overrode his vetoes, Johnson developed his own "Presidential Reconstruction" (essentially executive orders) and went on a national tour to promote his ideas and attempt to circumvent Congress. Trump is not the first to try and go around the will of the people, and use race to separate the population for his own needs.

Johnson encouraged the southern states to quickly establish governments with the pardoned confederate officers being elected to represent the southern states. While many northern citizens didn't like Johnson's hands off approach to reigning in the southern states, they felt it would help the south accept defeat and conform. The exact opposite happened.

Jim Crow laws were being passed across the south to deny rights to the former slaves. Congress passed the Civil Rights Law of 1866, defining citizenship for Americans of African descent. Iohnson vetoed the law contending it "discriminated against whites." Johnson would continue to undermine Congress's attempts to provide equal protection for all citizens, and would eventually be impeached by Congress. Johnson would make promises to the swing vote in the Senate that "he would stop impeding reconstruction efforts", and missed being impeached by one vote.

Johnson did not win the nomination for reelection, ending his impact on the new country that was being formed following the war.

The attack on DEI by Trump is very reminiscent of Johnson's efforts to build power by pacifying the southern states following the war. After denying knowledge of the Heritage Foundation's Project 2025 during the campaign, Trump is using the document as the playbook for his administration. Just as Johnson used the former confederates to assemble power, Trump opened his second term attacking DEI to rally his base around him.

After Johnson lost the nomination, he watched former Union Army General Ulysses S. Grant be elected president and refused to attend his inauguration. No president after Johnson refused to attend the inauguration of their predecessor until Donald Trump refused to attend President elect Joe Biden's inauguration in 2021. The similarities between Trump and Johnson are significant, with history not being kind to Andrew Johnson's presidency.

The next part in this series will deal with the rise of the robber barons Morgan, Carnegie, Rockefeller and Vanderbilt, and how they used control of the government to ensure deregulation, erosion of worker's rights and tipping into the tax base to accumulate their personal wealth to the determent of the country.

On Monday, in Grandville, MI State House Representatives Carol Glanville (84th) and Stephen Wooden (81st), along with Kent County Commissioner Kris Pachla (19th), hosted a town hall at the Meals on Wheels building on Wilson Avenue. The purpose was to discuss President Trump, Elon Musk, and the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) and how their actions will affect Michigan on the state, county, and local levels. Representatives from Kent County's Head Start Program, Department on Aging, and from Meals on Wheels also spoke on how their organizations, and their clients, will be affected by DOGE's funding and staffing cuts to various federal departments.

The first thing that Rep. Glanville wanted us to know is that the firing of federal workers is not limited to those based in Washington, D.C. Every state has federal employees that are being impacted by staffing cuts. (It should be noted that many of them are members of Unions, including the UAW.) Cutting staff also means that fewer people are trying to do the same amount of work. When overworked federal employees are not able to fully make up for the staffing shortages, people who depend on services from federal agencies do not get what they need. This will leave chunks of federal

money unspent, which will be an excuse for more funding cuts next year.

Federal funding makes up 42% of Michigan's annual budget. Lansing lawmakers are currently working on next year's budget, but it is hard to do without knowing how much we will get from Washington. Delays in passing the state budget impacts every department, school district, county, and municipality in the state who count on money from Lansing for their budgets. Schools also depend on federal funding that has already been cut by 49%. It is unclear at this time how to plug that hole in their budget. Cuts to Medicaid has resulted in the qualifying income level being lowered, which has already resulted in people being kicked off the program.

Their presentation covered funding cuts from DOGE and funding cuts due to anti-DEI (Diversity, Equality, and Inclusion) initiatives and their impact, both current and potential, on housing, Head Start, Meals on Wheels,



education, and county services including the Health Department. The picture they painted was pretty bleak. They spoke at length on the reduction to services that have already been enacted and the reductions that are expected to come. They spoke a lot about how our most vulnerable community members, low-income children and seniors, are being and will be impacted.

The group took several questions from the audience, but their answers, much like their presentation, was to tell us what is happening, what should happen, and what might happen; as well as how it will affect the people of Michigan. They told us that the state's Rainy-Day Fund will not come close to filling the gap in funding created by DOGE. What they did not offer was a plan, or even a proposal, on what to do about any of it. Rep. Glanville called on us several times to protest, to attend Republican town halls and ask questions in person. But none of the elected officials present said what they will do, or try to do, to ensure that these departments and programs get their funding. They spoke only of

reducing benefits here and tightening qualifications for benefits there.

Glanville, Wooden, and Pachla want us to raise our voices on these matters, and we should. Let's go to town halls and write to our representatives. Not just the ones who are actively helping Trump and Musk to undermine needed government services, but also the ones who we expect to actively oppose those efforts. Our Democratic leaders really need to have better answers for us than "I don't know." We need to demand that of them.

HOW AWARE ARE YOU? By Angel Collins

Hello Union family.

This might be one of my favorite articles, not only because it's personal to me, but because in the title is a very valid question. April is World Autism Month. How aware are you? Were you aware that 1 in 36 children are on the spectrum? Well, now you are. So, let's dive into the rabbit hole of information about ASD (Autism Spectrum Disorder) so you can not only be aware but be informed. The word "spectrum." is used to identify or classify something in terms of its position on a scale between two opposite points. There are many types of Autism, and it looks different for everyone. Each person can have different strengths and challenges. Some people can speak very eloquently while others can be completely non-verbal. Some may have intellectual disabilities and others may be incredibly intelligent, specifically in certain subjects or areas. One person may need assistance for their whole life while another may be completely independent. Then there are the ones in between who may only need assistance with some things but are just fine with others. That's a broad spectrum! If you're unaware of how ASD works, you may not know how to deal with someone who has it. I hope this article provides you with a little comfort and understanding.

Autism is usually diagnosed by age 5 with signs appearing by age 2 or

3. According to the CDC, boys get diagnosed with ASD four times more often than girls. Autism can look different in boys and girls. Girls are more likely to have subtle symptoms that sometimes go unrecognized to doctors. Many people with autism experience co-occurring conditions including ADHD

(attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder, anxiety and depression, GI (gastrointestinal disorders), seizures, and sleep disorders. It is also common for people with ASD to experience sensory issues or disorders such as hypersensitivity or hyposensitivity. Children can have a severe medical issue and not have the understanding or enough sensitivity to it to explain what's ailing them. A person's strengths and challenges can change, becoming better, worse, or even fluctuating between the two over time. Early intervention and therapy can make an incredible difference in their outcome and the challenges they

face later on in life.

Now on a more personal note. There's about 5 children and young adults that I personally know who are living with ASD, and two of them are my grandsons. One is 3 and the other is 5. Both are non-verbal but the 3-year-old seems to be developing a bit more in speech, mocking some of the things he hears while watching his favorite shows on television. He has a cadence that he moves to and he loves music. He gets as much pleasure watching the words move up the screen while the music plays in the background as he does while watching his favorite movie. I would often find him standing in front of the television, waving his hands like a conductor and always on cue. My 5-year-old grandson is happy, active and loves to play. He wants to climb and flip all day long, and his laugh is simply contagious. He's not yet grasping speaking but he's picking up a little sign language. While they both have their own challenges to face, these are also challenges for their parents.

To care for an autistic child can be very rewarding and also very



challenging. Imagine the difficulty of a mother or father not knowing what their child wants or what may be bothering them. Imagine a child that screams because they don't know any other way to communicate. When you are caring for an autistic child, you have to have patience and determination. Autistic children need constant direction and guidance. They may have to be directed and redirected to stay on or complete a task. Over time children with proper direction and structure tend to form habitual behavior. They will often conform to the structure they've been taught and naturally function

accordingly. Different medical issues can alter the outcome of their teachings which can feel like a reset button was pushed and everything you taught them went out the window. Don't give up! Autism is a lifelong disorder, and it can take time to manage.

There are several factors that can play a part in what causes autism. It's recommended that you explore genetic testing to see if there's a genetic cause for more severe cases. Causes can also be environmental. According to the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, it can range from parental age to air pollution, from

maternal obesity to low birth weight. Even maternal stress can add to the factor. Autism is complex and polygenic. It's considered a developmental disability because it affects how the brain develops and functions which can impact their ability to learn and interact with others. So, with all of this information I ask that you take your time, and study a little deeper if you need to, or if you have people in your life on the spectrum. Be a little more patient with the parents (and grandparents as well.) If you are one of them, you are not alone. Stay strong Union family. Til the next article...

WHEN THE MARKET IS DOWN

There is a lot going on with the economy right now, here are some different places to put your money to gain interest while the market is shaky.

- 1.) Real Estate, home prices have increased 47% since 2020. Of course, this takes a substantial amount of money to get into, if that's a problem you can invest in a (RIET) Real Estate Investment Trust. This is a company that owns, operates, and finances income producing real estate, allowing investors to participate in real estate ownership without directly owning property.
- 2.) Saving bonds, they are offered by the federal government and pay interest over a specified period of time, very low risk and the only way you could lose your money is if the government defaulted on its debt.
- 3.) Gold, it can be invested in a

variety of ways by buying gold bullion, gold coins, gold mining companies, gold futures contracts and mutual funds that invest in gold. When investing in physical gold make sure you use a reputable company.

- 4.) Certificates of Deposit (CDs) are bank accounts that offer a fixed rate of interest for a specific period of time, and are protected by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). If you withdraw the money before the term ends you will pay an early withdrawal penalty.
- 5.) Corporate Bonds pay interest over a set period of time, and then pays the face value of the bond when it matures. They can be purchased through the company or through secondary markets. Unlike with stocks you don't own any of the company, so you don't make any extra money if the company is doing well, and the same goes if the company is doing bad, your return is already set. Corporate bonds are often safe but there are no guarantees, you

- could lose your money by default or if the company files bankruptcy.
- 6.) Municipal Bonds, city and state governments also issue bonds to raise money for projects such as building new schools or highways. These bonds pay a lower rate than corporate bonds, the interest is exempt from federal income taxes. This makes your after-tax return comparable or higher than some bonds with better interest rates.
- 7.) Annuities, are contracts in which you agree to pay a certain amount of money up front in exchange for a series of payments over a certain period of time, or for the rest of your lifetime, from an insurance company, annuities can be fixed, variable or indexed. Annuities often offer the advantage of delaying taxes on the earnings until they are paid out to you.

I am not a financial advisor, but these are things I wish someone had told me when I was a new hire. We are saving for retirement, our kids, our families, work slowdowns, life emergencies, Strikes, and whatever else life throws at the middle class, United we Stand Divided we Beg..

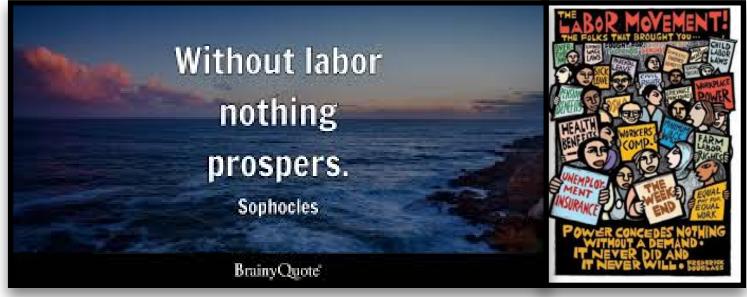
Labor History is American History.

WHAT'S WITH THE LAWN JOCKEY?

Greetings Brothers and Sisters, I wanted to share the story of the popular lawn jockey statues that we see on some lawns. There are several myths as to what the lawn jockey symbolizes, I've heard and read, that it can be a symbol of racism, showing blacks as servants in horse stables.

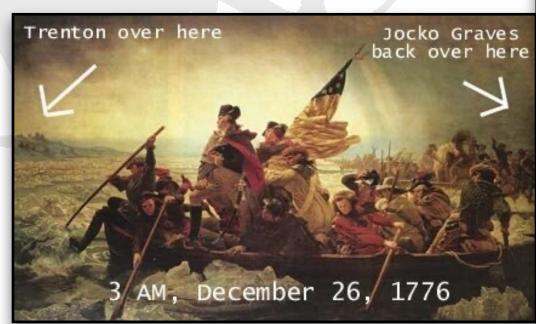
Another story associated with the lawn jockey, is that it was a signal for those traveling the underground railroad north to freedom. Houses displaying the lawn jockey were said to be safe

havens for runaway slaves. Lawn jockey statues are often associated with wealthy white Americans, this somewhat reinforces the negative imagery surrounding the black lawn jockey in the front yards of some white Americans.

Jocko Graves the son of Tom Graves a free man and about 60 other black men, were among those who answered the call of General George Washington on Christmas Eve, in 1776 for reinforcements for the battle with the British across the Delaware River. Jocko was only twelve years old; George Washington declared him too young to fight. Awed by the boy's passion to fight, the general asked him to watch over the horses and hold a lit lantern, so

that the soldiers could find their way back once the battle was over.

The next two days there was a freezing blizzard, when Washington and his army returned on the 26th they found young courageous Jocko frozen to death with the lantern still in hand. General Washington was so humbled by the young Jocko's sacrifice, he made a commemorative statue entitled, "The Faithful Groomsman". So for whatever reason one chooses to display the lawn jockey just know you are memorializing Jocko Graves sacrifice to this country.
